What does it mean to be a Hindu?

Knowledge

In this unit, the pupils investigate the concept of belonging and then relate it to how the key beliefs and practices in Hinduism help Hindus to feel like they belong to their religion.

The children look at how the daily life and actions of a Hindu are influenced by the religion they belong to.

Have Hindus to talk about their religion and how their beliefs shape their lives.

Learning Overview

Past learning

In Reception pupils have learnt about how different families celebrate different festival's and why they are important in their tradition.

In Year 1 pupils will have learnt about Christian traditions that take place in the home - prayers, worship, Bible reading and Christmas traditions. They will have learnt about Sikh traditions that take place in the home, like prayers, reading of the holy book each morning and visiting a temple. They will have learnt what different families do together around their religion, making Rakhi bracelets.

This unit's learning

Pupils will learn about the idea of life being cyclical and the idea of reincarnation for Hindu people. They will learn about Karma and duties of Hindu people. Draw and name all the objects on a puja tray and explain how they are used and why they are important to Hindu people. Explain what I would place on a tray to help someone from a different religion worship God.

Future learning

In Year 1 pupils will be taught about what it means to be a Muslim person of faith.

In Year 2 pupils will be taught about Hindu scriptures and the Hindu story of creation.

In Year 3 pupils will be taught about Hindu people's traditions and practices in their homes, building on the work in year 1.

Know about and understand: Making sense of beliefs

- Step 1: Recall, name and talk about simple beliefs, stories and festivals
- Step 2: Identify beliefs, describe them simply, give examples and suggest meanings

- Step 2: Give examples of what difference it makes to belong to and believe in a religion
