Learning Overview

Past learning

In Year 1 pupils were taught about special religious clothes and symbols e.g. Topee, Diva lights and special occasions, e.g. Christening, Christmas. They were taught about special

artefacts and events, e.g. Eid and prayer mats and Rakhi wristbands.

In Year 2 pupils were taught about why holy books are special, how people learn from them and why they are important to a believer.

In Year 3 pupils were taught about Diwali around the theme of light along with other religious festivals.

This unit's learning

In this unit, children will create their own piece of art and explain their choices to a specific religion.

Use and connect key R.E. vocabulary, whilst expressing their point of view. Consider the impact of symbols to a believer.

Future learning

In Year 3, children will be taught about symbols and sayings in the Sikh religion.
