












How and why do Hindus celebrate Holi?

Learning Overview

Past learning

EYFS pupils were taught about the Diwali festival.

In Year 1 pupils were taught about special religious clothes and symbols e.g. Diva lights and special occasions, e.g. Christening, Christmas and about special artefacts and events, e.g. Eid and prayer mats

In Year 2 pupils were taught about why holy books are special, how people learn from them and why they are important to a believer. About how the world was created according to the Hindu tradition.

This unit's learning

Children will be taught to relate the meaning from the story to Hindu practices today.

Describe what a Hindu might learn from celebrating Holi about what God is like.

Apply teachings from Holi to life today for a Hindu person.

Future learning

In Year 3 in the children will be taught about symbols and sayings in different religions.

In Year 4 children will be taught to use their knowledge of religious festivals like Holi to help them with their understanding about religions in their community and how religious buildings are involved in celebrations. They will be taught about how Hindu people worship within their home and in the Mandir.
